
Education is a gift that can never be taken away. An educated child is able to imagine a life that goes beyond the despair of today. School empowers children to develop a voice and make themselves heard.

However, the global reality is that millions of children will never receive this life-changing gift. Over 100 million children are not in school today. For families struggling to survive, educating children is a luxury they simply cannot afford.

As image bearers of God, every person should be given the opportunity to reach their full potential, as God has intended. The Sharing Way believes that children everywhere have the fundamental right to receive basic education. Through our education projects, thousands of children are being given the gift of learning that gives hope for a lifetime.

A gift to *Hunger for Change – Learning for Life* helps transform the lives of children, their families, and even whole communities.





After the loss of her mother and because her father was too sick to work, Durga, six years old, became a house servant. For a few pennies a day she cleaned dishes and did other household chores.

Though India passed a law in 1986 that prohibits children under the age of 14 from working in hazardous conditions, it remains hard to regulate.

Durga became one of the first students at the Child Labour Rehabilitation School in Tuni, where she flourished and eventually went on to college, where she took a health worker's training program.

Today, Durga is proud of her career as a nurse. She earns what is considered a good local salary, nearly \$70 a month, which provides for her family's needs.

The Child Labour Rehabilitation School in Tuni has been in operation for 15 years. Hundreds of children have successfully gone through the program and been empowered to break out of the cycle of poverty through the power of education. Today 56 children are enrolled at the school.

For only \$50 a month you can provide a child with the chance to learn and the opportunity to break the cycle of poverty.
